The Celebrant begins

I am Resurrection and I am Life, says the Lord. Whoever has faith in me shall have life, even though he die. And everyone who has life, and has committed himself to me in faith, shall not die for ever.

As for me, I know that my Redeemer lives and that at the last he will stand upon the earth. After my awaking, he will raise me up; and in my body I shall see God. I myself shall see, and my eyes behold him who is my friend and not a stranger.

For none of us has life in himself, and none becomes his own master when he dies. For if we have life, we are alive in the Lord, and if we die, we die in the Lord. So, then, whether we live or die, we are the Lord's possession.

Happy from now on are those who die in the Lord! So it is, says the Spirit, for they rest from their labors.



For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. - *Celebrant* You only are immortal, the creator and maker of mankind; and we are mortal, formed of the earth, and to earth shall we return. For so did you ordain when you created me, saying, "You are dust, and to dust you shall return." All of us go down to the dust; yet even at the grave we make our song: Alleluia, alleluia.

All are welcome to attend the Reception in the Parish Hall where refreshements and informal remembrances of Lisa will be shared.

The liturgy for the dead is an Easter liturgy. It finds all its meaning in the resurrection. Because Jesus was raised from the dead, we, too, shall be raised.

The liturgy, therefore, is characterized by joy, in the certainty that "neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord."

This joy, however, does not make human grief unchristian. The very love we have for each other in Christ brings deep sorrow when we are parted by death. Jesus himself wept at the grave of his friend. So, while we rejoice that those we love have entered into the nearer presence of our Lord, we sorrow in sympathy with those who mourn.

Lisa Hart (née Hopkins) died on Friday, April 26, 2024, at aged 66 after several long and difficult illnesses. Despite this, Lisa found meaningful activity in every day and was always there when her family or friends needed support and encouraging words.

Lisa attended Juniata College and worked in administrative roles during much of her professional life. She was a long-time member of St. Mary's Episcopal Church and recently celebrated 34 years of sobriety with her AA friends, sponsors, and sponsees. Lisa enjoyed reading, chatting with friends via her tablet, and visiting with family and friends in her recent years living at Shannondell.

She is survived by her loving husband of 45 years, Christopher, brother Chris (Kim), sister Vickie (Gary), stepsister Amy, stepbrothers Rob, Jay and Jim, and multiple cousins, nieces and nephews. She was preceded in death by her parents Barbara and James Hopkins, stepmother Liz, and older brother Caskey.
